Rather than produce completely new charts, I list here only the changes from the information given in The QC, March Quarter, 1990, pp. 6-10.

INTERNAL MAIL

At an unknown date between 1873 and 1878, the rate for samples and business papers was reduced to 1pt./50g. On April 1st, 1878, the rate was further reduced to 10pa./50g., and the weight stage for journals and printed matter was raised from 40g. to 50g.

The doubled rates previously in effect for mail to and from Upper Egypt/Sudan and to and from the Red Sea ports were rescinded on April 1st, 1878.

When the currency reform from paras to milliemes took place in 1888, the 10-para rates were converted to 2 mills. At that time (or perhaps as late as 1892), a reduced rate for printed matter for local delivery ("en ville") of 1m. was instituted (hence the 1m. and 2m. small postal stationery envelopes that were then issued). Please see figure 1, below.

Figure 1: The 1-mill local rate for unsealed printed matter, used in 1913. The stamp has the perforated initials C L (= Credit Lyonnais).



INTERNAL MAIL - continued

A reduced rate of 3m. for letters from soldiers and NCO's "on the frontier" was introduced at an unknown date (but before 1898); it apparently remained in force up to at least 1914.

In 1921, the rate for prints and samples appears to have been raised to 2m./50g. The same rate for periodicals came into effect SE 30, 1925.

EXTERNAL MAIL

The UPU rate (1875) for journals and printed matter was 20pa./50g.* It was changed to 10pa./50g. from AP1, 1878.




Figure 2: The 5-mills concession rate for enlisted soldiers and non-commissioned officers: March 1895.

A reduced rate of 5m for letters from soldiers and NCO's "on the frontier" was established perhaps as early as 1884; I have seen examples of it that did not originate on the frontier, so the conditions for its use were probably liberalized. Until the currency change of 1888, this rate was expressed as 20 paras. It lasted right up to the reconquest of the Sudan, and can be found prepaid with Sudanese stamps from 1897. Letters at this rate are (almost?) invariably addressed to the British Isles. (Please see figure 2, below).

EXTERNAL MAIL - continued

The reduced rate of 1905 for letters to the British Empire, Italy (and to Austria in 1908) applied also to the Italian colonies in Africa. The rate was rescinded for Italy and colonies on Jan. 31st, 1921, and for Austria on May 20th, 1920.

The rate increases of April 1st, 1921, included 4m./50g. for periodicals and for samples (minimum 8m. for the latter). The fee for Advice of Reception was raised to 15m. at this time. On November 1st 1921, the reduced rate for postcards to the British Empire of 8m. was introduced.

The bulletins of the United States Post Office dealing with exchange of international mails recorded at least annually the UPU postage rates for the various types of mail from each country, and the equivalence in gold centimes; these bulletins are thus a very useful source of information. According to them, the AR fee was raised to 20m. in 1931, to 25m. in 1940. The registration fee is recorded as being raised to 30m. in 1940, to 32m. in 1950, and to 45m. in 1951. The letter rate of 32m/20g., thought to have been introduced in September, 1953, was apparently in effect as early as 1951; the rate for each additional 20g. rose to 20m.

The postcard rate was raised to 20m. in 1951, and the rate for prints, periodicals, etc. became 8m./50g. + 4m. for each additional 50g., in 1950. In 1951, this rate was again increased, becoming 12m./50g. + 6m. for each additional 50g. The fee for express delivery was 40m. in 1934, and was increased to 50m. on 1941.

The dates in the foregoing paragraph are only approximate, since the bulletins came after the fact. They thus represent the latest date for the respective rates going into effect. There is one anomaly that requires clarification: between 1925 and 1926, the rate for prints, etc., was dropped to 2m./50g., where it remained through July 1931, but by 1932 it was back up to 4m./50g. according to the bulletins. I see no reason to doubt this information, but it would be nice to see it confirmed by actual examples.

Notes:

The distinction between "prints", "periodicals or journals", "samples", and "commercial (business) papers" was at one time important because the rates were different, but by the 1950's, they were grouped together for UPU mail as "other", and were marked by the letters AO (autres objets). "Prints" means printed matter such as books, pamphlets, announcements, cards of greeting, For the last it was customary to allow up to five words of handwriting (including a signature). "Periodicals" applies primarily to newspapers and magazines; the Egyptian rate for these applied to papers published in Egypt or the Sudan. "Commercial papers" means records, bills, invoices, old correspondence, etc., excluding current letters; therefore, handwritten material may be included if not of the nature of a current letter. "Samples" refers to merchandise of no significant commercial value, such as a sample of dried figs sent to a potential buyer. Generally the policy was to set a minimum for the postage on the last two categories of twice the weight stage (thus, 8m. when the rate is 4m./50g., for example); in the more recent decades, this formula may have been modified.

EXTERNAL MAIL - continued




Figure 3: a postcard mailed in October 1905, correctly franked from the Egyptian standpoint, which already permitted a message on the address side. The United States, however, treated the card as a letter, and taxed it double the deficiency (USA did not permit messages on the address side until June 29th 1906).

Picture postcards in international mail created a problem, for there was generally no space to write a message. From about 1904, many countries began to allow a message to be written on the left half of the address side; before that, such a message incurred the full letter rate. It was not until 1907 that the UPU approved the practice of allowing messages on the address side, whereupon all countries accepted it (and most put it into effect for internal mail as well). The postal cards issued by Egypt in 1907 and 1909 were in response to the change in practice. Please see figure 3 below.

Other HENDREY covers - sundry flights :-

Addressed to A.N.Hay, Baghdad (but obviously Hendrey's writing), cancelled Alexandria 28 FE 29, arrived Baghdad 8 MR 29, franked 45m (Reg'd), but correct rate should have been 42 mills.

To F.H., Alexandria, from CASABLANCA, with Air Mail cachet, franked 2 Francs, 55 centimes - Morocco air stamps, cancelled 13 SE 28, no arrival mark.

As above, franked 5Fr - Morocco, registered, canc'd 11 SE 28, no arrival mark.

Thank are due to those members who brought covers to the meeting, and also to Norman Clowes (ESC 349) for his valuable contribution.

Hendrey therefore remains a mystery man: he certainly generated a lot of philatelic covers of which those using the Khedivial Mail Line are the most important. If it were not for him there would be very few examples of this aspect of the postal service.

I cannot comment on the correctness or not of the franking on KLM, or other covers where stamps of other countries were used, but it can be said that Hendrey paid as little attention to true rates as anybody else who was engaged in philatelic mail during the period of the early First Flight covers which can never be relied upon to show the correct franking. However, for the First South Africa Flight, and subsequently, frankings were more accurate.

Needless to say, further information is still being sought, and I would welcome members' comments together with details of Hendrey covers in their possession. Furthermore, if any one could care to take on the "Hendrey" study, using the foregoing as a starting point, I should be delighted to hand it over - John Sears (ESC 188).

F. HENDREY - the MAN and HIS WORK - John Sears (ESC 188)

Most collectors of Egypt Postal History must be familiar with covers which were originated by a Mr Hendrey during the late 1920's and early 1930's. At a recent meeting of The Circle we attempted to compile a record of "Hendrey" covers and this is set out below, post.

Unfortunately, no progress was made in identifying the gentleman, although the following steps had been taken prior to the meeting to try to trace him, or any one who might have knowledge of him:-

- 1. Advertisements had been placed in two editions of THE TIMES, on 25th and 28th July 1991, requesting information as follows "HENDREY F, thought to have lived in Alexandria, 1929-1931. Students of Egyptian Postal History need to contact his friends or relatives concerning his philatelic activities. Box No. 4663." No replies were received.
- 2. In view of the fact that many of the covers were addressed to "Hendrey c/o Barclays Bank D.C.O., Alexandria", I approached the Personnel Department of the bank in London and, although they examined their records for the period, they could find no trace of the name.
- 3. Letters were written to people, with the same name, listed in the London Telephone Directory there were no replies.

We are therefore no nearer to getting more personal knowledge of him. However, if members in other parts of the country would care to write to the Hendreys in their local directory, please let me know: I will supply a copy of the letter I wrote; postal expenses will be refunded.

On the next page are shown reduced-size illustrations of covers which we believe may have been produced by Mr Hendrey.

It may be said that the great majority of the Hendrey covers were inspired philatelically, either to illustrate early Air Mail services, or to show the facilities aboard ships of the Khedivial Mail Line for acceptance of mail. If it were not for Hendrey, examples of the latter would be very scarce indeed.

Dealers' prices cover a wide range, going as high as £40 for a Khedivial cover, which is quite outrageous, down to £5/£7 for an Air Mail example, a price which is much more realistic.

At this stage one should explain that Khedivial Mail Line ships carried mail for addresses in Egypt, and this could be posted on board, presumably by handing it to the Purser who would cancel the stamps, using the ship's own handstamp. An ordinary letter would attract the normal internal postal rate, i.e. 5 mills from 1st April 1921; however covers of the 1920's and 1930's are often seen with higher frankings. Mail posted by travellers from abroad could be franked with stamps from their own countries to the value of their external rate to Egypt.

The handstamps of the ships were either circular or oval, with the name of the vessel in the centre and either the words "Khedivial Mail Line" or "Khedivial Mail Line S/S & Graving Dock Company Limited" around the outside. They also appear as a simple straight line. Colours of the impressions seen include black, purple and green.

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
F. HENDREY - Examples of Covers in his Handwriting (Reduced)
Note: the reduced size of these covers is justified because it is the handwriting which is drawn attention to, not the stamps and cancels!




All cursive script, note similarity to 1.

The writing of 'Mr F Hendrey" is very typical.




No letters joined - a typical Hendrey cover.




Same writing, but to different addressee.

Examples of Khedivial Line cancellations (actual size, except for the cover which is half size)










Air Mail Jottings - "Airjot 6"

Contributed by John Sears (ESC 188)

The 1 mill stamp of the 1933 Air Mail issue has been reported with three different 'white' flaws: the joined 'IE' of AERIENNES, the dot in the Arabic character to the right of 'AERIENNES' and the malformed second 'E' in AERIENNES. It is the latter that I am concerned with here.




Fig. 1 Fig. 2 Fig. 3

Numbered 5 (d) in the Zeheri catalogue, and illustrated therein, it was first reported by Jean Boulad (ESC 16) in L'Orient Philatelique of July 1939, page 529. The reproductions were not very clear but, from the actual stamp (no. 32 of every other pane with Control No. A/36), it appears as shown in Fig. 2, above. Fig. 1 shows the undamaged state.

I have recently come across a block of four with left margin attached, neatly cancelled ALEXANDRIA, 26 AP 38, and I feel this certainly includes stamp no. 32. The second 'E' is shown in Fig. 3 and this indicates a progressive enlargening of this flaw.

The 1 mill has Control Numbers of A/37 and A/38 subsequent to A/36, and it is reasonable to suppose that this block came from a pane with Control No. A/38.

Incidentally, Zeheri shows the colours of the 1 mill as being "orange-yellow" for the earlier printings (Control Nos. A/32, A/34, A/35) and "red-orange" for the later printings (Control Nos. A/36, A/37, A/38). I have recently seen a complete pane A/36 which certainly seems to be much paler (orange-yellow?) than the other two panes I have with the same Control. I should welcome any feed-back on either of these matters.



QUESTION TIME - Further news about "DOUBLE BRIDGE and 'A'" (Q. Time 104)

Q.Time No. 104

- by Lars Alund (ESC 105)

Some years ago (see QC Vol. xiii No. 12, pp. 265/66) some members of the ESC discussed the "double-circle" cds from Alexandria (ESC Type Arr - 6.5). This postmark was considered to be a transit marking, used in Alexandria only. The dates of use were given as between 13 MR 11 and 18 SE 11. All strikes were found on picture post cards.

Recently I have been able to purchase a lot of used stamps from Egypt and amongst them I found a postage due stamp (the 4 mills of 1889), cancelled with this postmark. Furthermore the date is much later than any mark previously recorded, viz... JU 12 (see illustration). This seems to be the only recorded case where this postmark has been used as a cancellation on a stamp.



(I do not think that this postmark should be referred to as "double-bridge". It is not the datebridge that is double but the surrounding circle-lines).


Q.Time No. 104

- by Themis Dacos (ESC 220)

A new item has been added in my collection. It is a small size cover sent by the Police Dept. at LAVRION, a little village about 40 miles S.E. of Athens, to Alexandria on 20 Oct. 12. It arrived on 16 NO 12 and received the 'Double Bridge and A' cds.

Remarks: 1) The Double Bridge + A cds now appears on a cover for the first time. So far it has been seen only on Post Cards.

- 2) In this case the DB+A cds is not used as a transit strike. It is used to show arrival, as there is no other strike of Alexandria on either side.
- 3) The time of use is now extended and the new Latest Recorded Date is 16 Nov. 12. The E.R.Date still remains unchanged (13 MR 11 P Andrews).

Supplementary Notes

Since the book* on this topic was published, an enormous amount of new information has come in, and the stream has not stopped. Most of it is concerned with extensions of the dates of use of the various datestamps, or with the discovery of the use of a TPO datestamp for a route for which it was not previously recorded. It would take many pages to record all the new information, and it will not be attempted in these notes. I am trying to devise an efficient way to present it all without reproducing all the tables in the book.

The present notes are for recording some entirely new routes, and three new types of datestamp.

(Another new route, ARMANT & ISNA, has been reported in an earlier QC).

There is another route, reported by Lars Alund, which is an enigma. It is clearly struck twice on a large fragment, in a Type resembling TPO 5A1a, with "& V.V." in place of "T.P.O.", and therefore is 7A3a, with both names curved: RIFAA EL BAHARIA / WAHAT EL KHARGA / & V.V., 7 JAN 14 T.-9. I do not believe there ever was a railway line connecting these two places in the desert west of the Nile, but perhaps there was an obscure, short-lived line of which I have never heard. The date is too early to be plausible for a motor-coach analogue of a railway TPO, and the distance seems too great for a Rural Service route. Can anyone help? Help!



Professor P A S Smith - Supplementary Notes - continued

The new routes listed are mostly self-explanatory, being on lines over which other TPO's, longer or shorter, are known. The WARDIAN - OMAYED route requires clarification. Wardian is a western section of Alexandria, and was the starting point of the narrow-gauge Dhaira Kassa line to Maryut and beyond into the western desert. It was converted to standard gauge in the pre-World War I period, and was then integrated into the Egyptian State Railways, with a change of terminus from Wardian to Alexandria proper. The Wardian-Omayed route represents a short run on the line, and Omayed was probably the end of standard gauge at the time (standard gauge reached Daba'a by the time of the war).

STOP PRESS!

There is further information as to the "Tutankhamun Telegram", thanks to the perseverance of Mr J M Murphy (ESC 240).

He confirms the date as being 6th November 1922, and that the telegram was sent from Egypt to England. (We therefore want a British Telegraph Form !). Lord Carnarvon was then in residence at High Clere Castle, Newbury.

The text of the telegram - including punctuation ! - is:-

' AT LAST HAVE MADE WONDERFUL DISCOVERY, IN THE VALLEY;

A MAGNIFICENT TOMB WITH SEALS INTACT;

RE-COVERED SAME FOR YOUR ARRIVAL;

CONGRATULATIONS ! '

Lord Carnarvon arrived seventeen days later, on 23rd November 1922 and the tomb was opened on 26th November 1922.
